Volunteer Fair Reveals Opportunities

The Drop-In on September 28 welcomed representatives from local non-profit organizations to tell us about their activities and how



volunteers help them achieve their mission. Most of them left additional materials in the CHPV office; if you would like more information, call the office or look the organization up on line.

The University of Chicago Hospitals: Currently have about 1200 volunteers filling a wide variety of positions (patient visits, playroom duty); candidates are interviewed and vetted, and expected to provide at least 100 hrs/year; volunteers receive free parking and a meal voucher for each 4-hr. shift



Hyde Park Neighborhood Club: Needs volunteers for homework help in the after-school program at 4:15; mentoring for middle and high school students who are not "on track", with meetings 1-2 times/month.

"Little Inspirations" Day Care Center, located at Hyde Park
Neighborhood Club: serves children 6 weeks to 6 yrs, with a focus
on play and community; volunteers needed to assist, particularly
for individual reading. All volunteers are vetted.

Experimental Station at 61st street: programs include bikes and bicycle works, working with children 8-20s on learning repairs and homework help; Farmer's Market volunteers for setup and take down, making coffee and welcoming shoppers, handing out surveys. Outside market runs through October; winter market moves indoors, meets once a month and has the same volunteer needs..

Cook County Elder Justice Center (50 W. Washington in Daley Station) uses volunteers to augment its small regular staff; the Center provides free legal and social services to seniors (60+), and does community outreach seminars twice monthly. Volunteers receive training to become greeters, tour guides, assemble literature on a seminar topic, or (after an 8-week training) to provide peer counseling.

Louise McCurry represented the <u>Hyde Park-Kenwood Community Conference</u>, the <u>Jackson Park and Harris Park Advisory Councils</u> And the <u>American Youth Soccer Organization</u>, all of which rely heavily on volunteers to support park clean up and development and to periodic HPKCC activities.

The <u>Kiwanis Club</u> representatives reminded us of the many good works Kiwanis members support and sought to recruit new members to rebuild the local chapter.

The <u>Ronald McDonald House</u> sent a representative to tell about the opportunities for working with families and children who are being treated at Comer Children's Hospital.



Keith Cooper, a member of Augustan Church and an instructor for the <u>AARP Driver Education Course</u> told us about the upcoming flea market fundraiser at Augustana and the opportunities to lower your auto insurance rate by taking the AARP class.

Last, but very important, CHPV told about the many opportunities and good works that our own Volunteer Program provides.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU... Ann & Cal Audrain and Family: Ann is Treasurer of the CHPV Board, and regularly helps with lunch!

When all the children were at home, travel always meant camping and backpacking. A motel was a real treat.

Our family has expanded to include spouses and grandchildren. We have a total of 8 grandchildren ranging in age from 3 months to 24



years. We love spending time with the grandchildren and often travel with our entire family. Our extended family has been on an African Safari, toured Morocco and ridden camels in the desert, visited Borneo and the Galapagos, sailed the Mekong and Amazon Rivers, crossed the Panama Canal, and visited Antarctica just to name a few places. Most of our trips have been during the Christmas holidays so we have not spent Christmas in Hyde Park for over 20 years. PROGRAM REVIEWS

"Super-Agers" in Japan: The Chicago OWL Chapter, CHPV, and SHARE co-sponsored a program on Saturday, October 1, featuring a Japanese geriatrician sharing her observations about how the changing demographics of Japan are impacting medical practice. *Chisato Fujisawa*, *M.D.* is in the U.S. while her husband does postdoc medical research; Chisato is learning about geriatric practice in the U.S. by "shadowing" Katherine Thompson, M.D., the Director of the SHARE project.

Similar to many countries in the world, the Japanese population is aging. Individual lives are longer, she believes largely because of healthy diets; the challenge is to increase the healthy life span as much as the surviving lifespan. In addition, because the birthrate



has declined substantially, and the country does not welcome immigrants, the overall population is growing much older. While this is considered a "success" it also creates substantial problems. Because Japan has provided nearly universal health care, the rising costs of medical care are nearing crisis. The goal is to help elders and die at home, but the social systems (such as volunteer village organizations) are not well developed. There are not enough family caregivers to provide unpaid elder care, and they do not have the immigrant populations that often fill those positions in this country. While the engineers have developed many ingenious products to help the elderly remain at home, these are not yet adequate.

Should we look at Japan for our future? Will we "escape" their problems through our traditions of volunteerism and immigration? Can we extend the years of healthy aging as fast as survival?

"I was raised in Iowa, where I attended college as a major in Psychology. Then, wanting to spend some time away from the Midwest, I went to graduate school in Psychology at Fordham University in New York City. Following graduate school, I did a postdoctoral training stint in Neurobiology for

three years at Caltech in Pasadena. I took a position at Northwestern University Medical School in Chicago and have been on the faculty at Northwestern since then. My laboratory group and I study learning in young and aging brain. We are currently focusing on mechanisms for long term memory storage as well as how memory storage changes as brains age. I am currently the Ernest J. and Hattie H. Magerstadt Memorial Research Professor in the Department of Physiology at the Feinberg School of Medicine.
