 The rate of ballot fraud is vanishingly small.

Out of billions of ballots cast nationwide from 2000-2012, there have been only 491 prosecutions for fraud (under 38 per year, on average, nationwide).



NOTICE: Due to COVID-19, voters are encouraged to use Vote By Mail or Early Voting before Election Day on Nov. 3, 2020.

1. Apply Now to Vote By Mail

Any Chicago voter may <u>apply online now to Vote By Mail</u> ahead of the Nov. 3, 2020 Election. No reason or excuse is needed to Vote By Mail. <u>Mail-in application form</u> <u>Need to check the status of your Vote By Mail application?</u>

Chicago voters who apply online between now and Sept. 24 will be among the first to receive ballots. Ballot mailings will begin Sept. 24-Oct. 5.

Chicago voters who apply online to Vote By Mail will receive emails:

- In the days that follow their online application, to confirm that the online application has been received and processed;
- When the ballot is being mailed to the voter -- with a unique link to a system to track the ballot through the US Postal Service;
- When the Vote By Mail "Ballot Return Envelope" is received by the Election Board; and,

- When the Vote By Mail "Ballot Return Envelope" has been approved for counting -- or if there is a question or problem with your Ballot Return Envelope.

If you are unable to apply online, the Election Board also will be sending Vote By Mail applications and postage-paid return envelopes in late July to all voters who have voted in any election(s) since Nov. 2018 and to any voters who have registered for the first time or updated their registrations since March 18, 2020.

• Due to Covid-19, voters are encouraged to use Vote By Mail or Early Voting before Election Day on Nov. 3, 2020;

• Voters may apply to Vote By Mail using this online system, or in person at the Chicago Election Board, or by mail, or by email;

• Voters whose completed Vote By Mail applications are received on or before Sept. 24 should receive their ballots between Sept. 24 and Oct. 5;

• After Oct. 4, the Board will mail ballots within two business days of receiving complete applications;

• Voters may ask to have the ballots sent to their registration addresses or to another valid mailing address for that voter;

• Vote By Mail Ballot Return Envelopes will have postage paid;

• Vote By Mail Ballot Return Envelopes may be completed and submitted at a Secured Drop Box at any Early Voting site or at the Election Board no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 3, 2020. If mailed, the Ballot Return Envelope must be postmarked before or on Election Day, Nov.3, 2020;

• The Ballot Return Envelope must be signed and dated by the voter, and that signature will be compared to the voter's registration record;

• Warning: Knowingly providing false information on an application to Vote By Mail or on Vote By Mail materials is a Class 3 felony.

c. You'll **get an email** when your ballot is mailed – with a unique link to a system to **track the ballot** through the USPS.

d. Mark your ballot with
black or blue pen only.

e. Fill in the **bubbles** next to your choices.

f. If you make a **mistake**, you can fix it.

3. Mail or drop off your ballot

- SEAL your ballot in the envelope
 + SIGN the envelope; then:
- a. Send by mail free/no stamps!

b. Send by UPS or FedEx

c. Drop off directly (2 options)

If you MAIL your ballot: It MUST be postmarked by Nov. 3 (Election Day). But DON'T DELAY. Mail your ballot ASAP: before Oct 14. Vnu



Once you submit your ballot: You'll get an email when: • Your "Ballot Return Envelope" is **received** by the Election Board

• Your Ballot Envelope is **approved** for counting

FREQUENTLY ASKED OUESTIONS

Q: What if I make a mistake?

Cross out the mistake and write in your correction. Add a note to show it is a correction.



Q: Can someone else drop my ballot in a Secured Drop Box?

YES – as long as your ballot envelope is sealed shut and is properly signed by **both you AND the person** dropping it off for you.



Q: Can I change my mind & decide to vote in person?

Yes, **IF** you have not yet sent in your mail-in ballot.

 Bring your ballot to polling place & ask judge to spoil it.
 Vote with a regular ballot.



Q: Can I change my mind & decide to vote in person? (cont)

 If you lost your mail-in ballot or never received it, you may have to vote on a provisional ballot.



Q: What if I don't get my ballot? Report to 312-269-7967 on or before Thursday, Oct. 29



IMPORTANT:

Once you submit your completed ballot, you **can't** change your mind or vote again.



Voters in line must practice social distancing with 6 feet (2 meters) of space between persons in line.

For the Nov. 3 General Election, Chicago voters may use any Early Voting & Registration location in the city, starting Oct. 1 at the Loop Super Site, and then starting from Oct. 14 at the 50 Ward sites. Chicago voters may use any Early Voting location in the city.

Any ballots that voters cast in Early Voting are final. After casting ballots in Early Voting, voters may not return to amend, change or undo a ballot for any reason. It is a felony to vote more than once -- or to attempt to vote more than once -- in the same election.

Government-issued photo ID is not required but is helpful if there is a question about the voter's registration, address, signature or if there are two voters at the same address with the same names or similar names.

Registration services are available at every Early Voting site. <u>Two forms of ID</u>, one of which shows the voter's current address, are needed to register for the first time or to file a name change or an address update.
